## Monetary Policy review

## A move to an accommodative stance

- Yesterday, the MPC voted to cut the benchmark lending rate by 100 bps to 12.5% while leaving other policy parameters unchanged. The decision centered on the need to stimulate growth in the economy amidst the corona virus pandemic. Reported figures for Q1 GDP showed a slow down to 1.87% YoY from 2.6% YoY in Q4 19. Furthermore, we expect the economy to contract by 1.95% YoY over Q2 20 hinged on the adverse impact of the pandemic (See report: Q1 2020 GDP A pre-pandemic glimpse into Nigeria's economy). Elsewhere, the MPC alluded the gradual increase in inflation largely to disruptions in supply chain and reduced supply of FX; but expect it to improve as gradual ease of lockdown continues and economic activities return.
- We reiterate our view on the symbolic nature of the MPR given its ineffectiveness of transmission to other key rates. As a matter of fact, the MPC at earlier meetings have also alluded to this. Instead, we have seen growth in credit (increase of ¥3.1 trillion since introduction of LDR) via the use of unorthodox policy such as the minimum loan to funding requirement. Hence, the cut makes us to believe a stronger signal to stimulating growth.
- On FX, flows at the IEW in the month of May has maintained same trend with the previous month. While inflows (-18% MoM) have remained low, outflows (-15% MoM) have been surprisingly low despite CBN resuming FX sales for school fees and SMEs. Similarly, CBN has recorded almost no sale at the IEW over the month. With the recent disbursement of IMF's loan facility (\$3.4 billion) and expected approval of facilities from the World Bank and AfDB, we believe there is no immediate concern to the reserves in the interim. Hence, this should give the CBN more headroom in supporting economy growth.
- That said, we expect the CBN to seek more effective ways of reducing lending rate in order to stimulate growth. Particularly, we can't rule out refund of excess CRR debit to banks. However, banks would have to submit a lending plan before getting the refund. This way, the CRR refund is given as credit and customers could benefit from lower lending rate due to competition across the banks. Elsewhere, we expect further implementation of credit growth mechanisms via loan to funding requirement and stimulus packages.
