Global Economy

◆ The number of coronavirus cases continued to rise globally, crossing 12 million with over half a million deaths, according to data from Johns Hopkins University. US continues to lead in number of daily cases, after it touched a record high of over 60,000, bringing the total number of cases to over 3 million in the US. Meanwhile, cases in India, Brazil, South Africa, among others, also continued to touch record highs. This sparked selloffs across market this week, as it stoked fears of a second wave of the pandemic. On data releases, the EU reported a record high increase in its retail sales by 17.8% MoM in May (April: -12.1%MoM). This came after two previous months of contraction and even surpassed consensus expectation of a 15% increase, as many EU regions reopened their economies after lifting lockdown measures. Non-food products saw the largest increase over the month of 34.5% (April: -16.7%) while food, drinks and tobacco rose by 2.2% MoM (April: -5.9% MoM).

Domestic Economy

• This week, data published by the NBS revealed Nigeria's public debt rose by 4.5% QoQ to N28.6 trillion in Q1 2020 due to devaluation of the Naira which occurred in March 2020. For context, CBN official exchange rate of N361/\$ was used in converting external debt to Naira, as opposed to N326/\$ in Q4 2019. To buttress, in dollar terms, external debt was largely unchanged at \$27.7 billion over Q1 2020. Consequently, we saw a faster increase in external debt by 10.7% QoQ to N9.98 trillion. Meanwhile, domestic debt which accounts for 65% of total debt stock, rose marginally by 1.4% QoQ to N18.6 trillion. A further dissection of the data revealed bulk of domestic debt emanated from FGN Bonds (72.7%) and Treasury bills (18.2%), while multilaterals and commercial loans accounted for 45.7% and 40.4% of external debts respectively. Elsewhere, domestic debt service moderated by 0.19% YoY to N609 billion while external debt service rose by 32% YoY to \$472 million.

Equities and stock recommendation

- ◆ This week, the NSI ASI dropped by -0.21% WoW to close at 24,306.36 points, while market capitalization declined by №15.5 billion to close at №12.68 trillion. Save for Banking (+4.93%) and Telecom (+0.10%) sectors, negative sentiments were seen across all sectors including Cement (-1.24%), Personal care (-3.95%), Food (-4.60%), Oil & Gas (-1.18%) and Insurance (-2.20%) WoW. For individual stock performance, major drivers for the downside were observed in DANGCEM (-0.79%), BUACEMENT (-2.50%), NESTLE (-6.51%), INTBREW (-2.53%) and UNILEVER (-9.78%) WoW. Meanwhile, positives were seen across ZENITH (+9.51%), GUARANTY (+7.93%) and MTNN (+0.09%) WoW.

Fixed Income

• Average fixed income yields declined further this week to close the week at 4.76%, a 12bps fall WoW. This decline came on the back of a 26bps WoW fall in the average bond yield to 7.41%. Within the bond segment the April-2023 (-135bps), July-2021 (-111bps) and March-2024 (-84bps) recorded the biggest WoW declines. The average NTB yield, meanwhile, climbed 2bpsWoW to 2.11%. The 182-day's 38bps rise was the highest recorded over the week. Lastly, the average money market rate remained high all week, closing at 13.90%. Although that is



Nigeria public debt stock

This week we feature Nigeria's public debt pile which came in at a total of N28.63 trillion at the end of Q120, a 4.47% increase QoQ. Domestic debt printed at N18.64 trillion, a 1.4% QoQ growth, accounting for 65% of total debt (Q419: 67% of total debt). External debt, meanwhile, came in at N9.9 trillion which marked a 10.7% QoQ growth.
