- Softer provisioning masks slowdown in Operating profit. Guaranty Trust Bank Plc (GTB) posted a decent nine-۲ months 2017 result supported by strong interest income (+36.5% YoY to N248.3 billion) and, more importantly, lower loan loss provision (-85% YoY to N8.4 billion) which managed to offset sizable decline on the non-interest revenue (NIR) leg (-59% YoY to N59.2 billion) to bring EPS to N4.27 (+7.3% YoY). That said, Q3 showed slowdown in operative performance. Despite an impressive trading income and lower provision in the quarter, the bank faced funding cost pressure to bring EPS on overall 70bps lower QoQ to <u>N</u>1.42.
- The funding pressures and lower provisioning ahead of expectation trigger some revisions to our estimates. First, we forecast a 6% ۲ decline in loan book as elevated yields on government securities continues to drive disintermediation. Elsewhere, we raise our cost of funds (WACF) by 20bps to 3.4% to reflect funding cost pressure. The foregoing drives our net interest margin (NIM) lower (-10bps YoY) to 9.5%. Furthermore, we forecast cost of risk to 0.7% and consequentially project 2017E loan loss provision of N10.6 billion (2016: N65.3 billion). Net impact of these changes results in Q4 17 PBT and PAT of N50.9 billion and N41.2 billion respectively with FY 17E EPS of N5.67. Beyond 2017, we cut our views regarding asset yields and annualized WACF as we think our call for a lower yield environment should moderate funding cost pressure but also depress asset yields. Post adjustments, our FVE for GTB increases to N44.50 (vs. N42.02 previously) relative to last trading price of N43.0 (+3.5% upside) which informs our NEUTRAL rating.

Last week, Lafarge Africa Plc. announced the opening of its right issue of 3.098 billion shares of 50 kobo each at a price of N42.50 per share based on 5 new ordinary shares for every 9 existing shares. The proceeds of the rights, of ~N132 billion, is targeted at converting the company's \$287 million quasi equity owned by parent—Lafarge Holcim—to ordinary shares. Given that the parent owns ~72.6% of Lafarge Africa, the proportion of the potential rights due to it is expected to be worth around N95.6 billion with the balance N36.07 billion set to be allocated to minority stakeholders. This, alongside the forthcoming N24 billion commercial paper borrowing, implies a rise in cash balance of ~N60 billion that could be used to slightly reduce pressures from working capital (*9M 17 negative working capital: N171 billion)* and expensive overdraft (N35 billion as at 9M 17). On balance, we expect the company's net debt position to print at N219 billion by year end (vs. N245 billion as at 9M 17).

- Base effect to flatter 2018 earnings. In line with current run rate of Nigerian cement volume and weighted average Nigerian cement price, we now project Nigerian cement revenue at N204 billion. However, having reviewed our target South African non-cement revenue 32% higher to N33 billion in line with 9M 17 performance, we now forecast overall group revenue 32% higher YoY at N290 billion (vs. N266 billion previously). The foregoing alongside higher input cost, operating expenses, and expected tax charge of N1.4 billion going by the recent return to tax payment, should drive 2017 PAT to N10.4 billion (vs. N16.9 billion in 2016). Going into 2018, we adjust our mean Nigerian cement price significantly higher to N40,000/ton (vs. N29,008/ton previously) which implies lower Nigerian cement volumes lower to 5.3MT. The duo should drive 2018E Nigerian revenue to N214 billion (vs. N253 billion previously). At the group level therefore, we see scope for sales in excess of N324 billion in 2018E (vs. N337 billion previously). In addition, although gains from energy flexibility have scarcely impacted 2017 performance, we look for improvement on this front in 2018 and therefore stick to a slightly lower cost to sales ratio of 70%. Thus, we expect a 29% YoY increase in gross profit to N97 billion (gross margin: +4pps YoY to 30%). Furthermore, we review our FY 18 OPEX to N45 billion in tune with current realities to leave our implied FY 18E PAT at N29 billion (vs. N10.4 billion in FY 17E) barring any positive surprise in form of tax writeback.
- Having factored in these adjustment as well as dilution impact in our model, we now have a FVE of and N47.59 (N64.46 without dilution) 8.5% discount relative to the last closing price of N52.02 implies a SELL rating on the stock.
