# United Bank for Africa Plc. (UBA.NL)

## Stock Report

## Higher NIR greases our valuation

• We have made some adjustments to our FY 19 forecasts for UBA following clarification at the management H1 19 conference call last week Thursday. We raised FY 19E non-interest revenue to reflect increased proportion of trading instruments in total investment securities than we had previously forecast. Elsewhere, management guided to possible writebacks from exposure to Ghana bulk purchasing company. However, given the increase in stage 2 loans YtD, we see some provisioning in the offing, with our FY 19E cost of risk revised lower to 0.6%. The impact of these adjustments was moderated by cut in NIM due to upward review of funding cost, with PBT revised 7% higher to \$126 billion (+18% YoY). Accordingly, we raised FVE to \$13.87/share (previously: \$13.04/share) and maintain our BUY rating on the stock.

• Key highlights for us from the call were: 1) management update on its exposure to Ghana bulk purchasing companies. With the resumption of payments to the individual companies by the government, they see some improvement which could necessitate reclassification and writebacks; 2) On the jump in the stage 2 loans (up N233 billion YtD, vs. improvement in absolute NPL by N18 billion), management stated that at least 60% of the Stage 2 is due to change in credit ratings and not necessarily deterioration in the loans; and 3) Swap positions was estimated at \$800 million with a net long position of \$328 million. The major issue for us on the call is the lack of clear guidance on the steps to address the gap in the bank's loan to deposit ratio, which settled at 48% as at H1 19, compared to regulatory benchmark of 60%.

• Coming into the year, we had expected a faster moderation in the trading book, to account for 45% of total investment securities from 61% in FY 18. As at H1 19, the trading book accounted for 58% of the investment book, with the bank booking total gain of <del>N</del>11 billion. We have adjusted the proportion accordingly. Coupled with gains on FX trading and the derivative book, we raised FY 19E net trading income higher to <del>N</del>50 billion (previous: <del>N</del>34 billion), with net fee income unchanged. Following the sharp growth in term deposits (19% YtD), with CASA growing 1% YtD and proportion declining to 74% (FY 18: 76%), we have adjusted funding cost to 4.4% (previous: 3.9%), with NIM forecast lowered to 4.5% for FY 19, from 4.7%. On its exposure to Ghana bulk purchasing companies (estimated at \$88.3 million with total provisions of \$51.8 million), management expects some writebacks in the course of the year with the resumption of payment by the government to the concerned obligors. However, we are cautious on the impact of this on the overall provisioning given the elevated levels of the Stage 2 loans and lack of improvement on its exposure to the downstream oil and gas sector (accounting for bulk of NPL). As a result, we lowered FY 19E cost of risk marginally to 0.6% (previous: 0.7%).

• The impact of these adjustments translated to a revised PBT of N126 billion (+18% YoY). Accordingly, we increase our sustainable RoE assumption to 16.4%, from 15% previously, following upward review of our three-year forecast to 16.4-16.7% (previous: 14.1%-15.4%). The adjustment is a 7% increase in our FVE to N13.87 and maintain our **BUY** recommendation. At current pricing and based on our FY 19E dividend of N0.96, we view expected dividend yield of 16% as attractive and could be compelling to investors. However, given the limited guidance by management on the impact a short fall in the loan to deposit/loan to funding could have on the Nigeria operation post the CBN's deadline of September 30th, we think valuation may remain depressed in the near-term. On our numbers, UBA is trading on FY19 P/E and P/B multiples of 3.4x, and 0.4x

#### **ARM ratings and recommendations**

ARM now employs a two-tier rating system which is based on systemic importance of the security under review and the deviation of our target price for the stock from current market price. We characterize systemic importance as a function of a stock's ranking among the group of top 20 stocks by NSE market capitalization over a trailing 6-month period (minimum) to the review date. We adopt a 5-point rating system for this category of stocks and a 3-point rating system for stocks outside this group. The choice of top 20 stocks arises from the consideration that this group of stocks constitutes >75% of overall market capitalization and stocks outside this group are generally less liquid and individually account for <<1% of market capitalization. For stocks in both categories, the basis for rating subject to target price deviation is outlined below:
