### Earnings Note: H1:2024

#### **Loss on Derivatives Drags Performance**

United Bank for Africa Plc recently released its audited H1:2024 financial result. Gross earnings grew by 39.65% YoY to NGN1.37trn following impressive interest income growth. Interest Income surged by 134.32% YoY to NGN1.00trn while Non-Interest Income declined by 33.60% YoY to NGN367.49bn, an offshoot of a lower net trading and foreign exchange income. On the other side, Operating Expenses increased by 109.75% YoY to NGN474.80bn owing to employee expenses, energy, and maintenance cost. Profit Before Tax (PBT) and Profit After Tax (PAT) declined by 0.51% YoY and 16.36% YoY respectively to NGN401.58bn and NGN316.36bn consecutively. Consequently, Net Profit Margin decreased by 15.45% to 23.07% in the period.

#### Income from Investment Securities & Customers Loans

Interest income rose by 134.32% YoY to NGN1.00trn in H1:2024, driven majorly by a surge in income from investment securities (+149.10% YoY to NGN474.48bn) and interests on loans to customers (+92.49% YoY to NGN343.76bn). This correlates with the expansion in investment securities (+85.30% YoY to NGN11.50trn) and loans to customers (+50.94% YoY to NGN6.79trn) as well as the elevated interest rate environment during the period.

#### **Higher Interest on Customer Deposits**

Interest expense advanced (+142.57% YoY) to NGN328.94bn on the back of a surge in interest on customer deposits (+106.70% YoY to NGN204.49bn) in H1:2024. This aligns with the sharp increase (+80.35% YoY) in total customer deposits to NGN20.09trn. Although CASA (cheap deposit) proportion improved to 87.55% of total deposits in H1:2024 from 83.65% in H1:2023, the eventual surge in interest expenses is attributable to the higher interest rate environment in 2024. Consequently, annualized cost of funds increased by 0.41% to 2.69% in H1:2024. Furthermore, Net Interest Margin (NIM) improved (+1.08% YoY) to 4.87% in H1:2024. Finally, Net Interest Income increased by 142.57% to NGN674.62bn.

#### Non-Interest Income: Loss on Derivatives Offsets FCY Revaluation Gains

Surprisingly, non-interest revenue decreased by 33.60% YoY to NGN367.49bn due to the sharp decline in net trading and foreign exchange income (-76.53% YoY to NGN98.18bn), following a net loss of NGN311.70bn on derivatives. The loss on derivatives largely stems from fair value loss on maturities in the year (loss of NGN498.82bn). This masked the gain on foreign currency revaluation of NGN326.18bn.

Furthermore, fees and commission income increased by 99.01% YoY to NGN250.62bn due to the increased electronic banking income (+107.83% YoY to NGN106.15bn), funds transfer fee (+188.66% YoY to NGN26.73bn) and credit related fees and commissions (+107.57% YoY to NGN32.94bn) in the period.

On the expense leg, Fees, and commission expense advanced 121.50% YoY to NGN105.52bn, an offshoot of higher E-banking expenses (+100.56% YoY to NGN83.15bn) in the period. Overall, total net non-interest revenue declined by 48.21% YoY to NGN261.98bn.

#### Personnel and Energy Cost Spikes OPEX

Operating expenses increased by 109.75% YoY to NGN474.80bn as personnel-related costs (Employee benefit expenses) spiked 92.91% YoY to NGN133.86bn. Similarly, the increase in energy costs reflected in higher fuels, repairs, and maintenance expenses (+218.74% YoY to NGN47.85bn). Furthermore, AMCON levy increased by 71.87% YoY to NGN70.33bn. Finally, due to higher growth in operating expenses vis-à-vis operating income, cost-to-income ratio increased by 21.82% to 50.69% in H1:2024 from 28.87% in H1:2023.

#### Bottom-Line Slightly Took a Hit

UBA's PBT and PAT both declined in the period by 0.51% and 16.35% respectively to NGN401.58bn and NGN316.36bn consecutively. This is following the sharp decline in non-interest income amid higher operating expenses in the period. Consequently, annualized Return on Equity (ROE) declined to 21.20% in H1:2024 (vs. 44.18% in H1:2023). Similarly, Return on Assets (ROA) declined to 2.23% in H1:2024 (vs. 4.92% in H1:2023).

For 2024FY, we expect improved performance on the back of higher interest income relative to 2023. The lender's digital banking drive should also improve Non-Interest Revenue, barring any further hit from derivative loss. We maintain our 2024FY target price of NGN29.57 for UBA and compared to its close price of NGN27.35 as of 4<sup>th</sup> of October 2024, we put a **HOLD** rating on UBA.

#### ARM ratings and recommendations.

ARM now employs a two-tier rating system which is based on systemic importance of the security under review and the deviation of our target price for the stock from current market price. We characterize systemic importance as a function of a stock's ranking among the group of top 20 stocks by NSE market capitalization over a trailing 6-month period (minimum) to the review date. We adopt a 5-point rating system for this category of stocks and a 3-point rating system for stocks outside this group. The choice of top 20 stocks arises from the consideration that this group of stocks constitutes >75% of overall market capitalization and stocks outside this group are generally less liquid and individually account for <<1% of market capitalization. For stocks in both categories, the basis for ratings subject to target price deviation is outlined below:
