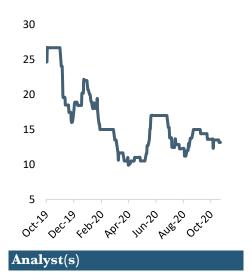

## Stock Report

#### FX losses trumps positive sales outturn

Unilever Nigeria recorded a 93.9% YoY increase in revenue to \$17.39 billion, its first YoY revenue increase in 2 years (since a 6.6% YoY growth in Q318). Despite cost of sales also increasing, the increase in revenue was enough to lead gross profit higher to \$3.73 billion (from -\$1.71 billion in Q319). However, higher operating expenses and net finance costs meant that Unilever still reported an after-tax loss for the period of \$2.52 billion albeit an improvement from the N3 billion recorded in Q319. For the 9M period, revenue was down 13.4%YoY to \$44.73 billion but a faster fall in costs (-17%YoY) meant that gross profit rose 2.6% YoY to \$9.8 billion, with related margin at 22.1% (+344bps). Total loss over the 9M was \$2.06 billion compared to a profit of \$540.6 million in same period in 2019.

- Sales surge higher: Over Q320, revenue rose a remarkable 93.9%YoY to ¥17.39 billion on the back of strong showings from both of the segments in their revenue portfolio. Food was up 84%YoY to ¥9.83 billion while Home & Personal Care rose even faster by 107%YoY to ¥7.57 billion. For us, the improvement in sales mirrors a blend of the low base from last year as well as recovery in volumes over the quarter, given the relatively flat prices over the period. Notably, revenue increased by 24% QoQ which is positive for the company, given the challenging environment. To recast, Unilever began its credit tightening policy in Q319 which ate into its sales in the following two quarters in a bid to cut down on its receivables.
- Cost of sales was up 27.9% YoY to N13.67 billion and although the low base of Q319 could explain some of that rise, the 21% QoQ rise shows that the low base cannot account for all of it. In our last report we highlighted an expectation for cost pressures to remain following the technical devaluation in March and the reduced FX supply. We therefore believe this played a factor in the higher cost over Q320. However, we saw gross profits rose by 118% YoY to N3.73 billion, given the faster increase in revenue with gross margin printing at 21.4%.
- Unilever recorded an operating loss of N1.45 billion (Q319: -N4.64 billion) as operating expenses jumped by 68% YoY to N4.7 billion. The increase in opex came from increases in both admin costs (+80%) and distribution costs (+28%). Though the cash position dropped

by 25% QoQ to N35.3 billion, we believe the sharp drop in finance income (-95% YoY) stemmed more from the steep decline in the interest rates, with interest on deposits lower by 77% YoY. Finance expense rose 624% on the back of higher losses from re-measurement of their FX balances. This led to a net finance cost of N0.58 billion from a net finance income of N0.56 billion in Q319. On the whole, Unilever record an after-tax loss of N2.52 billion, an improvement from the N3 billion loss they recorded in Q319.

After implementing their credit tightening last year, we struggled to see how Unilever would drive sales going forward. With two quarters of consecutive QoQ increase this year, we believe this result is a step on the right path towards a recovery in sales. That said, with the 9M sales tracking ahead of our projections, we now expect FY 20 sales to tick up mildly by 2% YoY (previously: -25%). Beyond this year, we expect sales to grow by an average of 3% over our forecast horizon. Also, we do not expect a re-occurrence of the FX losses reported this year and therefore expect the company to return to profitability from next year. On the back of this adjustment, our FVE estimate has increased to N16.03 which translates to a **BUY** based on current price.

stocks by NSE market capitalization over a trailing 6-month period (minimum) to the review date. We adopt a 5-point rating system for this category of stocks and a 3-point rating system for stocks outside this group. The choice of top 20 stocks arises from the consideration that this group of stocks constitutes >75% of overall market capitalization and stocks outside this group are generally less liquid and individually account for <<1% of market capitalization. For stocks in both categories, the basis for rating subject to target price deviation is outlined below:
