Global Economy

♦ As economies resume activities, retail sales data for the month of May showed signs of improved consumption, particularly in the US and UK. US retail sales spiked 17.7% MoM after contracting by 14.7% in April, owing to increased purchase of clothing and furniture. This marked the sharpest jump on record and even beat consensus expectation of an 8% increase. Similarly, UK retail sales rose by 12% MoM in May, after contracting by 18% in the previous month. The recovery surpassed consensus expectation of a 5.7% increase and was driven by increased purchase of household items. It is worth stating that despite the recovery, retail sales in both economies remain lower than last year's, as they were both down by 6.1% and 13.1% YoY, respectively. Meanwhile, the central bankers in Japan and UK met this week and both voted to leave their respective interest rates unchanged at −0.1% and 0.1%, respectively. That said, both central banks increased stimulus packages, with the BOE increasing the purchase of government bonds by £100 billion to £745 billion, while the BOJ increased the lending packages for businesses to \$1 trillion, from the ~\$700 billion announced last month.

Domestic Economy

♦ Headline inflation for the month of May printed at 12.40% YoY, 4bps above the prior month of 12.36% YoY, hinged on increases in both food and core inflation. Unsurprisingly, core inflation anchored the increase for the second consecutive month, expanding 14bps to 10.12% YoY, reflecting increases in health (+39bps), Transport (+31bps), Furnishing (+6bps), Clothing (+6bps) amongst other sub-indices. We believe the demand for health services and elevated transportation cost – a fallout of restrictions in movements – spurred the sharp rise in health and transport inflation. Meanwhile, food inflation rose slightly by 1bp to 15.04% YoY, as uptick in processed food (+40bps to 15.1% YoY) and imported food (+2bps to 16.26% YoY) outweighed declines in farm produce (-3bps to 15.04% YoY). A glance at the month on month numbers revealed headline inflation increased by 14bps to 1.17% MoM driven by food inflation (+25bps to 1.42% MoM) while core inflation dipped 5bps to 0.88% MoM.

Equities and stock recommendation

- ◆ The NSE ASI extended loss from prior week, declining by 1.41% WoW and closing the week at 24,826.75 points with the market capitalization at №13 trillion (-1.41%). Negative sentiments were seen across all sectors excluding Food (+5.77). Cement (-1.40%), Insurance (-1.98%), Oil & Gas (-13.54%), Brewers (-8.55%) and Banking (-2.56%) were the losers for the week. For individual stock performance, major drivers for the decline were seen across ZENITH (-3.0%), GUARANTY (-3.54%), DANGCEM (-6.47%), UBA (-5.19%) and NB (-9.52%) stocks. On the other hand, positives were observed majorly in BUACEMEN (+6.02%) and NESTLE (+10.0%) stocks.

Fixed Income

◆ At the NTB auction, the CBN (on behalf of the FG) rolled over №14.61 billion worth of NTBs which matured this week, at an average stop rate of 2.53% (21bps lower than last week's auction). This was despite the strong 6.09x subscription rate (№89.01 billion). At the bond auction, despite subscription of №545.16 billion, the FG did not completely fill its №150 billion offering. Only №100 billion worth of bonds was sold, with the average stop rate printing 78bps lower at 10.38%. Meanwhile, at the OMO auction, the CBN sold only №80 billion worth of bills (same as offer) off the №167.58 billion subscribed. The stop rate here was unchanged at 7.24%. In the secondary market, average fixed income yields were down an astonishing 96bps WoW to 5.56%. Average NTB yields declined 122bps to a new low of 2.17% led primarily by a 180bps decline in short-tenor bills. Average bond yields also reached a new of low 8.96% following a WoW fall of 70bps. The biggest drops over the week were seen in the April-2029 (-135bps) and the Jan-2026 (-129bps) bonds. Meanwhile, the CBN hit banks with a \$598 million CRR debit in a bid to protect the naira. As a result, average money market rate spiked 4.9x to 15.92%.



Inflation

Headline inflation in Nigeria increased 4bps to 12.4% YoY as at May 2020. This is the ninth consecutive increase on record and highest rate since April 2018. Food inflation hit an over two-year high of 15.04%, amid supply chain disruptions caused by lockdown restrictions.
