Global Economy

♦ The IMF now forecasts the global economy, in 2020, could contract even more than was earlier estimated in April, with the new estimate now printing at −4.9% (previously: -3%). The revision was necessitated by a worse than anticipated impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and could mark the worst recession since the Great Depression in 1930 when the global economy contracted 10%. Advanced economics are expected to record bulk of the contractions (-8%, previously -6%), with the US (-8%), UK (-10%), Euro area (-10%) and Japan (-6%) all recording contractions. Meanwhile, developing economics are expected to contract by 3% (previously 1%) as all major economics post contractions, save for China which is expected to grow 1% (previously 1.2%). The composite PMI readings in the eurozone and US showed there were signs of recovery in June, albeit still in contraction. This largely mirrored the impact of the eased lockdowns, as economic activities resumed. The US composite PMI increased to 46.8 from 37 in May, while the eurozone rose to 46.9 from 39.4. That said, the increase in the number of new coronavirus cases this week, particularly in the US and China, have sparked more concerns of a second wave of the pandemic.

Domestic Economy

♦ Recent indicators suggest a weak performance in business activities as the Manufacturing Purchasing Managers Index (PMI) contracted for the second consecutive time to 41.1pts in June 2020 (May: 42.4pts). This reflects declines in production level, new orders and delivery time. Similarly, the non-manufacturing PMI shrank to 35.7pts, albeit an improvement compared to the prior month (May: 25.3pts). Meanwhile, the IMF revised Nigeria's growth forecast lower. It now expects the country's economy to contract by 5.4% (Prior: -3.4%) citing disruptions to supply chains as well as significantly lower oil receipts due to the drastic fall in crude oil prices − a fallout of the pandemic. Elsewhere, a stimulus plan worth N2.3 trillion designed to mitigate the adverse impact of the pandemic on the economy, was approved by the federal executive council. Specifically, the plan is targeted at businesses and sectors which has been severely affected including SMEs, hotel industry, restaurants, transport and Educational sectors.

Equities and stock recommendation

- ♦ This week, the NSI closed relatively flat at 0.01% WoW. The week also rounded off with 24,829.02 points and a market capitalization of N12.95 trillion (+0.01%). Positive sentiments in both telecom (+4.26%) and food (+3.87) sectors helped neuter declines across (-1.81%), Insurance (-2.19%), Oil & Gas (-12.25%), Brewers (-7.86%) and Banking (-1.48%). For individual stock performance, major drivers for the gain were observed across MTNN (+1.21%), AIRTELAFRI (+9.97%) and NESTLE (+9.64%) stocks. On the other hand, negatives were seen across STANBIC (-8.33%), DANGCEM (-1.54%), BUACEM (-2.27%) and NB (-7.89%) stocks.

Fixed Income

Average fixed income yields declined 27bps WoW to 5.30% on the back of a 61bps decline in the average bond yield to 8.35%. There were declines across most bonds this week, with only the Feb-2028 and Jul-2030 closing the week flat. The biggest declines were seen in the March-2024 (-151bps), April-2023 (-127bps), March-2027 (-119bps) and the April-2049 (-72bps) bonds. At the other end of the curve, the average NTB yield was up 7bps WoW to 2.24% and this followed on from a 13bps rise in the yield of short-tenor bills. In the money market the OBB was slightly higher by 3bp WoW to 15.20% while the Overnight declined 57bps WoW to 16.1%.






Participation in the NSE

This week, we feature the trend in foreign and domestic investors' participation into the Nigerian bourse. As the chart reveals, total value traded declined by 7.4% MoM, due to a 33.7% moderation in foreign transactions. This muted the 11.2% MoM increase in domestic transactions. A glance at the domestic transactions showed increased participation by both institutional (+19% MoM) and retail investors (+4.4% MoM) for the month of May.
