Global Economy

◆ The Eurozone's private sector edged closer to stability in December, as revealed by the bloc's latest PMI reading. Composite PMI printed at 49.5pts (October: 45.3pts), spurred by growth in manufacturing sector output (PMI rose to 55.5pts from 53.8pts) and a slower pace of contraction in services PMI (up to 47.3pts from 41.7pts in October). In the U.S, the Fed left the target range for its federal funds rate unchanged at 0-0.25%, while also pledging to increase its holdings of Treasury securities and agency mortgage-backed securities by \$80billion and \$40billion per month respectively. With regards to economic projections, the Fed now sees the economy contracting by 2.4% (September: -3.7%) in FY20, while a faster pace of expansion is expected in 2021 (4.2% vs 4%) and 2022 (3.2% vs 3%). Elsewhere, the Bank of England voted to retain interest rate at a record low of 0.1% and also maintain the size of its bond-buying program at £875billion as policy makers adopt a wait-and-see approach amid uncertainty surrounding a post-Brexit trade deal and Covid-19 resurgence. Lastly, China posted its fastest growth in retail trade this year as retail sales ticked up by 5%YoY in November (October: 4.3%YoY). Sales rose for automobiles (+11.8%YoY), cosmetics (+32.3%YoY) and telecoms (+43.6%YoY) as consumption recovered further from Covid-19 induced disruptions.

Domestic Economy s

♦ This week, data on Nigeria's capital importation and headline inflation was released by the NBS. The former declined by 74% YoY to \$1.46 billion, mirroring declines in foreign portfolio investment (-86% YoY to \$407.3 million) and other investment (-73% YoY to \$639 million) which outweighed the 100.8% increase in foreign direct investment to \$414.8 million. A further probe into the sectors revealed production, banking and shares accounted for bulk of capital inflows with a cumulative of 73%. Elsewhere, headline inflation rose 67bps to 14.89% YoY, spearheaded by uptick in food inflation (+92bps to 18.21% YoY). For context, underwhelming harvest, flooding, higher transportation cost - a fallout of higher PMS prices (+4% MoM to N167.3 in November), and increased demand due to upcoming festivities, weighed heavily on food prices. Hence, farm produce and imported food inflation rose by 156 bps and 8bps, respectively. Elsewhere, core inflation moderated 10bps to 11.04% YoY despite increases across core sub-indices. Similarly, MoM inflation rose 7bps to 1.62%, spurred by increases in food inflation (+8bps to 2.05% MoM) while core inflation dipped 54bps to 0.70% MoM.

Equities and stock recommendation

- ♦ Following last week's decline, the Nigerian bourse returned to a positive trajectory as the ASI appreciated significantly by 7.46% WoW to print at 36,804.75points while market cap came in at №19.2trillion. Except for Breweries (-0.01%) and Insurance (-9.71%), all other sectors posted gains with Telecom (+11.36%), Cement (+9.12%), Personal care (+7.96%), Food (+5.21%) and Banking (+4.24%), leading the pack. Diving into the sectoral performance, we observed that AIRTEL (+21.00%), DANGCEM (+14.48%), UNILEVER (+11.24%), ZENITH (+9.25%) and NESTLE (+7.50%) WoW were the key drivers for the upside. Conversely, declines were seen across MANSARD (-60.00%), INTBREW (-12.67%), NASCON (-9.38%), and STANBIC (-0.11%) WoW, amongst others.

Fixed Income

There were two auctions this week, - one NTB and one bond. At the bond auction, the last one of the year, the DMO only sold half (N30 billion) of the total amount it offered (N60 billion) despite total subscription coming in at 2.23x the offered amount (N134.06 billion). The average stop rate at this auction rose for the first time since August by 158bps to 6.97%. Meanwhile, at the NTB auction, N7 billion was offered and sold which matched the amount maturing. Total subscription was N121.53 billion, 17.36x the offered amount while the average stop rate dropped 71bps to 0.56%. In the secondary market, the average fixed income yield was up 30bps WoW to 2.61% mirroring contrasting moves at both ends of the curve. For context, the average bond yield closed up 65bps WoW to 4.83% supported by a rise in the Jan-2026 (+119bps), Jul-2034 (+180bps) and Apr-2037 (+186bps) instruments while the average NTB yield shed 5bps WoW to print at 0.40% as the 91-day (-10bps) and 182-day (-26bps) bills closed lower.



Q320 Capital Importation

Foreign investment into Nigeria rose by 13% QoQ to \$1.46 million. However, it declined by 74% YoY, largely driven by the 86% YoY and 73% YoY reduction in the inflow from FPIs and Other Investments. Unattractive rates on OMO securities and surging inflationary numbers combined with CBN's policy on putting on hold FX repatriation during the course of the year may have weighed on the willingness of FPIs to invest fresh funds into the economy. Also, the crave for safety over returns following the pandemic -induced impact on the global economy may have also accounted for the reduced appetite for Naira denominated investments. Furthermore, the Naira exchange rate risk also played a role in the subdued foreign investment flow into the country. By sector, Production, Banking and Shares received the highest capital inflow with a combined 73% of the total capital inflow. Finally, the United Kingdom emerged as the top source of capital investment in Nigeria in Q3'20 with \$594.65 million.
