Weekly Commentary & Stock recommendation

...for the week 7th February - 11th February 2022

Global Economy

On Thursday, a Bureau of Labor Statistics report revealed that consumer prices in the US accelerated at the quickest pace seen in four decades last month. In detail, the annual inflation rate rose to 7.5% in January 2022 (December 2021: 7%), largely reflecting soaring energy costs, strong demand, labor shortages, and persistent supply disruptions. Energy remained the biggest contributor to the overall index (27%YoY) while there were also upticks in the cost of used cars and trucks (40.5% vs 37.3%); new vehicles (12.2% vs 11.8%); food (7% vs 6.3%); shelter (4.4% vs 4.1%) and medical care services (2.7% vs 2.5%). Elsewhere, the British economy expanded 6.5%YoY in Q4 2021, following an upwardly revised 7% growth in Q3 2021, preliminary estimates showed. Government spending (11.6%YoY), household expenditure (8.9%YoY) and gross fixed capital formation (2.3%YoY) all rose during the quarter while business investment and exports declined 0.8%YoY and 0.6% YoY respectively. Considering FY 2021, the economy grew 7.5% (FY 2021: -9.4%), leaving the nation's GDP 0.4% below its pre-pandemic level.

Domestic Economy

On Wednesday, the Nigerian National Petroleum Company Limited announced the result of its operation from August 2020 to August 2021. It posits that the income generated from the sales of Premium Motor Spirit, popularly called petrol was NGN2.61th for the period. Meanwhile, scarcity of petrol permutated some parts of the country this week and this was attributed to the discovery of contaminated product. The federal government, on Wednesday said it will carry out a major investigation to know the circumstances surrounding the importation of adulterated fuel into the country. Elsewhere, the CBN launched a new forex repatriation scheme, RT200. RT200 which stands for Race to \$200bn is a set of policies, plans and programmes for non-oil exports that will enable the country to generate \$200bn in forex repatriation, exclusively from non-oil exports, over the next three to five years. Meanwhile, the CBN revealed that it will stop the sale of foreign exchange to Deposit Money Banks by the end of the year.

Equities and stock recommendation

The Nigerian local bourse All Share Index (ASI) this past week closed at 47,202.30pts after shedding 0.16% Wtd. While tickers such as GUINNESS (+24.61%), NCR (+10.62%), and SCOA (+9.88%) posted uptrends, the negative turn on PHARMA-DEKO (-16.67%), NEM (-10.00%), and CHAMPION (-9.09%) among other tickers nudged the index to the negative territory. Sectoral wise, performance was mixed. Positive momentum was seen across BREWERS (+3.37%), BANKING (+0.41%), CEMENT (+0.02%), CONSTRUCTION (+1.18%), FOOD (+0.54%), and INSURANCE (+0.97%) respectively. On the flipside, the OIL & GAS (-1.70%), PERSONAL CARE (-4.90%), and TELECOM (-0.52%) counters all dipped in the week.


Fixed Income

The Nigerian Treasury Bills secondary market ended the week on a bearish note, as investors switched their attention to the primary market for Wednesday's auction. Consequent on this, the NT-Bills benchmark curve expanded by 15bps WoW to 4.43%. Meanwhile, the FGN Bonds segment traded mixed, as investors showed their preference for short-dated bonds (17bps) while slight selloffs were seen at the belly-to-tail end of the curve. Overall, average yield across the curve declined 5bps WoW to settle at 11.23%. In the primary market, the Apex bank offered NGN98.07bn but sold NGN214.96bn worth of treasury bills across three maturities (91-day: NGN1.91bn, 182-day: NGN1.82bn, 364-day: NGN211.23bn). Total subscription at the auction came in at NGN446.32bn, yielding a subscription and bid-to-cover ratio of 4.55x and 2.08x respectively. Stop rates on the 91 and 182-day bills remained at 2.48% and 3.30% respectively, while the yield on the 364-day maturity edged down 20bps to 5.20%.


