Global Economy

• Preliminary PMI results in the Eurozone indicate a slowdown in economic activity. The composite PMI narrowed to a 3-month low of 50.1 in September (August: 51.9) led by a contraction in services PMI to 47.6 (August: 50.5) while manufacturing PMI rose to 53.7 (August: 51.7). Looking at individual countries, there were declines in the composite PMIs for Germany (to 53.7 from 5.4) and the UK (to 55.7 from 59.1), while France reported a contraction in business activity with PMI printing at 48.5 (August: 51.6). Further slowdown can be expected in the near future as most countries in the zone roll out fresh lockdown restrictions to mitigate effects of a fast-spreading second wave of covid-19 infections. In the US, business activities dipped in September as represented by composite PMI which decreased marginally to 54.4 (August: 54.6) as improvements the manufacturing sector (to 53.5 from 53.1) was offset by a decline in the service industry (to 54.6 from 55.0). Lastly, Thursday's Labor Department report revealed initial jobless claims had increased marginally to 870,000 from 866,000 in the week ending Sept 18.

Domestic Economy

♦ This week, the Central Bank of Nigeria held its two-day policy meeting with the Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) announcing some changes to the policy parameters. Precisely, the Monetary Policy Rate (MPR) was reduced by 100 bps to 11.5% - the lowest since 2016 when the economy was embattled with a recession while the asymmetric corridor was adjusted from +200/-500 bps to +100/-700 bps around the MPR. The reduction in the asymmetric corridor translates to a lower rate of 4.5% (previously 7.5%) for the Standing Deposit Facility (SDF). Meanwhile, the MPC cited the need to address the weakness in economic growth via the provision of cheaper credit and in turn curtail the northward trend in inflation rate. Elsewhere, recent PMI numbers showed a further contraction in both the manufacturing (Sept: 46.9 pts vs August: 48.5pts) and non-manufacturing PMI (Sept: 44.7 pts vs August: 41.9 pts), reflecting a slowdown in level of business activities for the month of September.

Equities and stock recommendation

- ♦ The bearish trend in the Nigerian bourse was halted this week after two consecutive weeks of losses, with NSE ASI up 292bps WoW. The ASI closed at 26,319.34points, while market cap came in at №13.75 trillion. Except for personal care which lost 391bps, all other sectors recorded gains with Breweries (+22.55%), Oil &Gas (+3.76%) and Banking (+3.74%) leading the pack. A further probe into the sectoral performance revealed the major drivers for the upside were observed in NB (+25.12%), WAPCO (+15.77%), FLOURMILL (+8.59%), PRESCO (+8.16%), GUARANTY (+6.51%), WoW, amongst others. On the other hand, declines were seen in AIICO (-20%), OANDO (-11.74%) and UBN (-6.54%) WoW, amongst others.

Fixed Income

September's bond auction was held this week and we saw the DMO offer N145billion but only allocated N106.14 billion with 98% of that (N103.8 billion) coming via competitive means. Total subscription was 2.48x the offered amount at N360billion while, on the back of the cut in the MPR, the average stop rate was down 84bps to 8.09%. Meanwhile, N300 billion worth of OMO bills matured this week, however, the CBN sold just N70 billion at the auction, the same amount they have sold at each OMO auction this month with the 1yr stop rate declining by 18bps to 8.70%. Over in the secondary market, despite an 8bps WoW increase in the average NTB yield to 1.65%, the average fixed income yield fell 20bps WoW to 4.05% reflecting declines in average bond yields. For context, average bond yields shrank by 48bps to close the week at 6.45%, in reaction to the cut in MPR as most activities in the bonds market were seen between Wednesday and Friday, after being flat prior to the MPC's decision.





August equity market participation

This week we feature equity market participation for the month of August. The data shows that overall value traded fell 8.4% MoM to N94.5 billion led by a 19.1% MoM decrease in value of transactions domestic investors. The value of transactions by foreign investors, meanwhile, rose by 12.7% MoM. Foreign investors accounted for 41% of total value in August while domestic investors accounted for 59%, a shift from the 34% and 66% respectively in July.
